

Survivor Truths: Residential Schools, Art, and Reconciliation – *New* school program

DESCRIPTION

The Canadian Museum of History is proud to launch a new school program, in collaboration with the Alberni Indian Residential School Survivors Art and Education Society and Indigenous artist, master carver, filmmaker, and intergenerational Survivor Carey Newman (Hayalthkin'geme). It uses art created by students at the school in the 1950s and early 1960s as well as oral histories filmed with these Survivors as inspiration for reflections on Indigenous relationships to land, residential school history, colonialism, and students' own place in Canada's road to reconciliation. Students will participate in a series of guided activities, created in collaboration with Survivors and Newman, focusing on the powerful role of land in this history and in reconciliation efforts.
